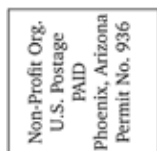
Esteemed Lecturing Knight, Jeff Beasley

Our theme this year was “What Does Patriotism Mean to me”. Rules and fliers were sent out to 50 schools within a 5 miles radius of our lodge. We received 70 essays from 3 schools. The essays were very good and our panel of judges enjoyed reading them. My thanks to our judges, Billy Walker, Perry Bishop, Kathy Allasia and myself.

The essay winners were:

• Division I 5th grade

Madison Graff, Sophie Kaplan, and Nameya Navaneeth. All from Desert Trails Elementary School and in Misty Hoyt's class.

• Division II 6th grade

Sarah Haddaoui, won first place in her division at the state level and will be sent on to National, Kingston Henson, won last year as well, both were from Quail Run Elementary School and Mrs. Forkum's class. Liam Karr was Desert Trails Elementary School and Misty Hoyt's class.

• Division III 7th grade

There were no essays submitted.

• Division IV 8th grade

Madisen Hove, Max Prante and Claire Sichi (Claire won 2nd Place at the state level and received a nice plaque). All were from Shea Middle School and Mrs. Kabaj's class.

Our students wrote, “Patriotism is both a sacrifice and an honor. It is not something that you just do, it is something that you have.”

“Patriotism includes honor, community, and independence. Honor represents the soldiers and military leaders that protect America. Community represents everyday people. And independence represents our rights and freedom.”

“Patriotism to me is celebrating America and how the Patriots made America by not giving up. It's all about celebrating the American Revolution victory, the original patriots, and all our national holidays. To me Patriotism feels like an honor to be part of a great country whose history is very unique and special in its own way.”

“Patriotism is more than just wearing the colors of your country or singing the national anthem, it is a deep love

and respect for one’s country, its people, and its values. By being a responsible citizen, respecting the flag, and embracing diversity, I can show my patriotism in a meaningful and impactful way.”

“Patriotism has many meanings. We all know it’s meaning, but are you a patriotic being, do you live the pledge of Allegiance, do you respect our history? This magnificent country isn’t perfect, but we can do all we can to make it flawless and that’s why we vote and express our patriotism.”

“Patriotism means many things to me. ...doing what is right for the good of your country and your people. ...support your country through the good and the bad. You become a patriot because you believe in the ideals of your country and your government. For Patriotism is not a question of the mind, but a question of the soul-- to believe in something that transcends time and even space, for what our heart believes, cannot be taken away.”

“...to me Patriotism is the sense you hold so much adulation for something, your country, that you have such loyalty to have Patriotism be a very important aspect of your life. This devotion can be a combination of feelings for its language, its ethnic, cultural, political, or historical aspects. People can show their Patriotism physically, not just mentally. By celebrating our country’s holidays, by fighting for our country, by fighting for our civil rights, or by being willing to sacrifice for the overall good and progression of one’s country. Patriotism can be concluded in a simple way. Allegiance, the way we pledge ourselves to America when we say the Pledge of Allegiance.”

“It’s about being connected to something bigger than myself, whether that’s the history of the United States, or the freedom and opportunities that come with being an American. Being patriotic doesn’t always mean agreeing with everything the government does. It means caring about your country to want to make it better, speaking up when something feels wrong, working towards positive change. It’s not perfect, but I believe in its potential, and that’s why I feel proud to be a part of it.”

“And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you – ask what you can do for your country,” (John F. Kennedy). This summarizes my ideas about Patriotism. It means to show gratitude for my country and the freedoms I enjoy. Whether it’s saying, “thank you for your service,” and shaking the hand of a veteran or helping with the school food drive, I find it gives me a certain feeling again and again. It’s a debt I owe to so many Americans, a debt no one expects to be paid back, but I strive to fulfill every day. I use my free speech and right to assemble to support and celebrate veterans, and volunteer to help others in need. I use my right to schooling to educate myself and learn about our history and government so I can better participate in our democracy. These simple acts of gratitude and service are what patriotism means to me.”

Our Essay winners received certificates and \$100 gift cards from Office Max/Office Depot. We want them to continue writing and expressing their ideas. Their essays go on to the District Level and if they win, then on the State, and if winners at State, then on to national. This is a national Elks event and the national winners are announced at the convention. Good luck to all our kids.

Elks History

Did You Know?

Back in 1896, Phoenix was a small but growing town with fewer than 6,000 residents. Arizona was still a U.S. territory; statehood was more than a decade away and N. O. Murphy was serving as the Territorial Governor. Despite its size, Phoenix was full of energy and promise, and that same year, a group of local visionaries came together to establish what would become a lasting pillar of the community: the Phoenix Elks Lodge

Across the nation, big changes were also underway. William McKinley had just been elected President of the United States, signaling a new era in American leadership. Meanwhile, in a small workshop, Henry Ford was busy building his very first gasoline-powered vehicle, a modest invention that would one day change the world.

1896 was also a landmark year for the world stage. The modern Olympic Games were revived in Athens, Greece, bringing nations together through sport for the first time in over 1,500 years.

Through all this progress and transformation, the founding of the Phoenix Elks Lodge stood out as a proud local moment. It marked the beginning of a legacy rooted in charity, community service, and American values — one that continues to thrive nearly 130 years later.

The building above was the Paton Opera House, located at 300 West Washington Street. The original architect was S. E. Paton, who constructed the building in 1896 for an estimated \$35,000. Built in the ornate Queen Anne style, the theater featured a pair of conical towers, almost 20 complementary bay windows, and could accommodate 1,200 patrons. The theater's grand opening was held on November 2, 1896, with a presentation of *At Gay-Coney Island* playing to a sold-out audience. On December 29, 1899, Paton sold the theater to E. M. Davis, and it was renamed the *Davis Opera House*. In the 1910s, the name was changed again to the *Elks Theatre*. The theater played host to many theatrical presentations, from Gilbert and Sullivan's *H.M.S. Pinafore* to John Philip Sousa in 1915. The building was torn down in 1985.
